AMENDMENTS</b> These By-laws may be altered, amended or repealed and new By-laws may be adopted by 2/3rds of the Directors present at any meeting, if at least two (2) days written notice is given of intention to alter, amend or repeal of, to adopt new By-laws at such meeting. The revised By-Laws will be provided to the voting membership via mail, facsimile or electronic methods, as determined by the Nevada Indian Commission Board, for a 30-day comment period. If no concerns are brought to the Nevada Indian Commission Board within that 30-day comment period, the revision will be considered final and binding.</p>
